

Every Tuesday night, we have an English as a Second Language (ESL) program from 6 - 8 pm with three levels of classes. Our students have come from Pakistan, Mexico, Brazil, Chile, Nigeria, Colombia, South Korea, Mali, Guinea, China, Haiti, Venezuela and Guatemala.

At the end of every ESL class, we have a short Bible lesson. The students learn how to use the Bible and are eager to read out loud as the lesson proceeds. Often they have questions, and several have spoken to us outside of class and have received Christ as Savior. Many of these students will stay in America, but some will return to their home countries.

Speaker at the National Easter Convention of Assemblies in JAMAIICA

The conference began the evening of Good Friday and culminated with 2 sessions on Easter Monday. I was privileged to be the speaker at all 3 sessions, as well as at a leadership breakfast on a Saturday morning.

Easter Monday is regarded as "the great day of the feast." Busloads of people came from many of our 86 sister assemblies scattered all over Jamaica. We could sense God's hand of blessing in each service, and it was a real joy to see scores of people publicly responding to rededicate their lives to the Lord.

We had planned to have my wife, Sherryl, fly out of Philadelphia the evening of Easter Sunday and spend overnight in Miami so she could fly out early enough to be in Jamaica for both sessions on Monday. Unfortunately, her early morning flight from Miami was to be aboard a 737 Max; that is one of the planes that were recently grounded by the FAA. 

To your *health*By Margaret Aitcheson OSTEOPOROSIS

Osteoporosis is a condition in which bones become weak, porous and brittle. It is very common in the United States. Throughout our lives our bones undergo a process whereby old bones are broken down and new bones are formed to replace them. In young women hormones such as estrogen regulate this process maintaining bone density. During menopause, bone loss is accelerated due to the decrease of estrogen, with less new bone being built to replace it. Only about 20% of men develop osteoporosis. Exercise can protect bone density.



Bones affected by osteoporosis have a lower density or strength. They become fragile and more likely to break. There are many risk factors for osteoporosis. Women—especially those who are white, Asian, small, thin and older—are more susceptible. Risk factors are: diets low in calcium and vitamin D, lack of exercise, smoking and large alcohol intake. These factors are controllable.

Signs of osteoporosis include receding gums due to bone loss; decreased grip strength; brittle and weak fingernails; cramps; muscle aches; bone pain; and loss of height. Untreated osteoporosis can lead to serious bone fractures, especially in the hip and spine.

Your physician will order a bone density or DEXA scan to measure bone mineral density and diagnose osteoporosis. Prevention is very important. Dietary intake of calcium, vitamin D or exposure to sunlight (which causes the body to produce vitamin D), protein and phosphorus intake all support building bones and other tissues.

If you suspect you may have osteoporosis, discuss this with your physician and get tested and treated. \Leftrightarrow



Sisters of Compassion Mission Trip Report

We praise the Lord for all that was accomplished during our mission trip to Jamaica February 2-8, 2019. We were a blessing to the Flankers community in St. James Parish in the Montego Bay area of Jamaica. The church leaders and the people in the community were grateful for our medical service and partnering with them in this tremendous outreach. The medical clinic was held each day Monday to Friday at Faith Baptist Church from 8 am to 1 pm. On some days, we stayed at the church till

4 pm because the people wanted the specific service of eye exams. In the evenings from 6:30 pm to 9 pm there were crusade meetings at the church with evangelist speaker Pastor Mason. We provided and ministered to the whole man through medical care as well as met the spiritual needs of the people through witnessing, spiritual counsel and prayer for specific personal issues.

The medical team of eight consisted of 2 doctors, a nurse practitioner, a pharmacist, 3 nurses and 2 laypersons. Sisters of Compassion Ministry members Lourine Powell, Carol Pessoa, Sharon Henry and Dr. Obi Iro were a part of the medical team that served. We saw an average of 45-75 people each day during the week of the medical clinic. Thirty-eight people came to know the Lord as Savior and many more expressed interest in meeting with someone to learn more about Jesus and to discuss spiritual things.

"Urbana was extremely life-changing! It was amazing how God came through and had everything play out. It all started when I first booked my hotel for Urbana. I booked it at a hotel close by on a whim, mainly for its close proximity and price. However, when I was preparing for the journey, I realized that Urbana was hosting a few lounges at that hotel. One of them was a south Asian lounge!

From growing up in a predominately white town and often struggling with social anxiety, I was hesitant with engaging with people, especially with those from my culture." [Vithusha's family is from Sri Lanka.] "But when I found out about this lounge, I felt God encouraging me to seek it out. I went with hesitation. I sat near the very back fearing that I wouldn't be welcomed. Surprisingly, one of the InterVarsity staff members told me to sit with him and his friends. Ever since then, all of the members in the lounge made me feel like family.

I often felt the constant pressure of maintaining a 'perfect' image, and with that grew low self-esteem and

anxiety. Going to a predominantly white school, I thought my story was unique and that no would really understand me; however, after talking to some people at the lounge, I realize that this problem is real and very damaging to many young south Asians, especially women. A few days before this encounter, I made a verbal declaration to God. I gave all of my worries to God -- living a life that my parents will be okay with, having a lucrative career, and the path of how I will fulfill my calling to God. So after witnessing these two things, I realize that God might be calling me to ministry among young south Asian women, about women empowerment and loving themselves as the highest King's daughters.

Looking back on my life, it seems as if every step I walked with God would eventually come to this amazing calling. I would love to have you pray for me to trust God and the faith He's given me to guide me to His will for me. I would love to have a lot of support with like-minded people to encourage and help me tend to this hurting community. All in all, I've learned how victorious God is and I'm so thankful for the amazing gift that He's given me of being in fellowship with other south Asian Christians. I'm beyond grateful for your contribution to help make this happen. Thank you and God bless."

In mid-April, several of the youth from GCA--Andrea Henry, Stephanie Quarshie and Jonathan Jackson, along with their coach Gerardine Elie--participated in the annual GOGF Ministries Bible Bowl and received second place for the second year in a row. The youth competed against Montco Bible Fellowship and New Life In Christ Fellowship.

Each year, a few months prior to the Bible Bowl competition, GOGF announces to the participating churches the selected chapter that the teams will be studying. Last year, the teams were challenged to study John 3; this year the chapter to study was Proverbs 4. Each team is required to learn the chapter with a specific version of the Bible--in this case, the New King James Version (NKJV)--ensuring that each team will all know the same information required. Each year with the chapter given, there are five verses that they are expected to memorize and recite word-for-word. During the competition, each team is seated at their respective tables with individual buzzers. The questions are from four categories: fill in the blank; multiple choice; general knowledge; and verse memorization, all ranging from 5 to 15 points. There limitations for certain questions. There are strict guidelines and procedures to follow as well. Each team is made up of four starters and as many substitutes as desired. If a team has less than four they are still eligible to compete. Memorized verses **must** be quoted from the NKJV--no exceptions allowed. The judge makes the final decision. No individual team member can answer more than two questions in a row: this ensures that the team is not dominated by one individual person. Teams are penalized the point value of the question for all incorrect answers.

As the coach of these young Christians, Gerardine could not be prouder of them. With only three team members, and only about a month and a half to fully study and memorize, Gerardine wholeheartedly believed that they put up a strong and courageous fight. She observed that some of them felt disappointed and discouraged by the fact that they were not able to win first place, but she always tried to encourage them by telling them that **winning** is not the primary goal; rather, it's learning more about God and meditating on His Word. Gerardine loves participating in the Bible Bowl because she thinks it's a good way to get the youth to really focus on the Word of God and connect with other young Christians. Gerardine is not sure how long she will continue being the coach; but she plans on continuing each year for the foreseeable future.

Hey, young person, why don't **you** plan on getting involved for the next Bible Bowl? ❖
