Love's Acid Test (Part 2 of 2)

Each person must purpose in his own heart what percentage to give. But as we prayerfully consider this, God will challenge some to put on the training wheels and start at 10% and He will challenge others to go way beyond 10%.

God wants to stretch your faith. Some of you may not believe you can afford to give tithes **and** offerings. Someone has well said "the reason many can't afford to tithe is because they don't tithe". Today I challenge you to put God to the test; and remember **it's easier to live on 90% of your income inside the will of God, than to live on 100% outside His will.**

4. I give - because of my responsibility under the Great Commission.

Mt 28:19 - Go and make disciples of all nations. **2 Cor. 9:11-13.** People all over the world are

praising God because of our giving. When we give it has eternal impact. Many unsaved will be in heaven because you gave.

Love's Acid Test (Part 2 of 2)

Notes from a sermon by Pastor Brian H. Grant (Continued from the last issue)

2. I Give - Because it impacts God's blessing on my life.

2 Cor. 9:6 - Don't miss this, it's impossible to sow sparingly and bountifully reap God's blessings.

A farmer who was a generous giver said, I keep shoveling into God's bin, and he keeps shoveling back into mine, but He has the bigger shovel. I believe if the truth of this principle soaked into our souls, it would radically impact our life. But sadly, the evidence suggests that many Christians don't have the faith to act on this. Moody Press reported a few years ago that the average church member contributes between 1.5% and 2.5% of their income to the Lord's work. A survey of income to giving revealed that only 8% of born again adults actually did give 10% or more to the Lord's work.

What about you? Where do you fit? God is saying, he who sows sparingly will reap sparingly and he who sows generously will reap generously. Our giving impacts God's blessing on our life. But don't give to get. Give out of love. If you give hoping to get material wealth you may end up in spiritual poverty. God's best blessings are not necessarily financial or material. Are you sowing bountifully?

3 - I give - Because it stretches my faith.

2 Cor. 9: 8. God will supply us with all we need at all times. What an incredible promise. Reluctance to sow generously reflects a refusal to believe that God will carry out His promise. It's a matter of faith.

I am convinced that one of the most practical ways to grow your faith is through giving. **Here's why**; it forces us to deal with the question: Can I trust God to take care of me or must I hold on to the money to make sure I can take care of myself? If we learn to trust Him with our money we'll trust Him in many other areas.

How do you determine how much to give? Let me give you 2 principles:

1. It should be purposeful - 2 Cor. 9:7; Let each one do as he has purposed in his heart. This means that our giving shouldn't be haphazard. Don't wait until you get to church.

2. It should be proportionate to our income. 1 Corinthians 16:2 - On the first day of every week, each one of you should set aside a sum of money in keeping with your income, saving it up, so that when I come no collections will have to be made.

Does that mean Christians should practice tithing? 10%. They shouldn't need to. When my kids were small, I taught them to ride. And the first thing I did was put training wheels on the bike to help them balance. But once they learned to ride I took off the training wheels. Tithing is like training wheels, we learn to give to God 10% of all our earnings, that's our gross income. It helps us to purpose and learn percentage giving; but once we learn we don't need the training wheels any longer because that's the base from which we now operate.

"Find Out What Pleases the Lord" - Eph. 5: 10 (NIV)

In the church, God has brought a disparate group of people together under one roof, but it remains the challenge for God's people to put into practice the unity that He created when He made us one in Christ Jesus.

True unity begins in the mind: that's where we understand and decide in favor of God's truth. That's what it means, to believe.

"Be transformed by the renewing of your mind" is the way Paul puts it in Romans 12: 2.

We come to Christ 'messed up' in our thinking that's why we do wrong things, make bad decisions and have relationship problems. Christ wants to change all that by changing us into the kind of people that reflect His character and nature rather than our own fallen and corrupted nature. We call it, "heart change" - but at a practical level, it begins in the mind.

Even so, that's only the start, because it may take a while for God's truth to have its intended effect. It may take a journey through many experiences and trials, including even those of many failures, for God's truth to sink down into the bones of who we are and how we relate to one another, and bring the enduring kind of change that honors Christ and brings Him glory.

Oh yes, one more thing. Every one of us is a work in progress! That's why we need to spend time in the Word every day, getting to know what the truth of God is all about, and what it is that pleases Him. \diamond

Christian Union is the umbrella organization of Yale Faith and Action, the campus ministry that I have been involved in since my freshman year. Christian Union operates on the Ivy-League campuses and seeks to change culture and develop Christian leaders. For more information, go to http://www.christianunion.org/about/mission-a-vision.

This past summer in Uganda was certainly the best six-week period of my life. From the initial day that I entered the village of Mawanga until my very last day in Uganda, I experienced God's love in a new, more complete way, primarily through His people.

The majority of the nine-person Christian Union team that I went with stayed in Uganda for two weeks, while a student named Ruby and I stayed for an additional month after that. During the initial two weeks, there were zone leader trainings, home visits, and a Saturday children's program. The zone leader trainings were targeted at community leaders, but were mostly a time of receiving, rather than pouring out for me, because the sessions were conducted by pastors and by two other team members. I learned several key lessons during those days, including insights about hope, casting vision, and prioritizing.

We then went on home visits to learn about some of the people's lives and to pray with them. We met "Asher," a widow with eight kids, whose house had burned down. She lived in her brother-inlaw's vacant house, which could be taken from her at any point when the brother-in-law decided to return for it. We went to the home of "Ahalam," a Muslim man who was at the training session and had said that one of his gifts was preaching the gospel. I asked him if he could see himself turning to Christianity, and he said that based on what he had seen and heard through ROWAN's involvement in his life, he could see himself deciding to follow Jesus because he now had something he previously didn't have: hope. A couple weeks later,



he gave his life to Christ!

On Saturday, there was the weekly children's program, which involved crafts, sports, debate, music, and Bible stories. I helped teach Bible stories, which I greatly enjoyed.

Once the two weeks had passed and the rest of the team left, Ruby and I remained to continue serving in the village. Our task was to visit the 120 people in the "special group" (ROWAN members who are HIV+). The ultimate goal of the home visits was to demonstrate the love of Christ by caring for the people, especially since they have often been stigmatized and isolated by people in the community for being HIV+; and we prayed that people would confess Christ as Lord as well. During each home visit, we conducted surveys, in which we asked a series of 30 questions, including questions about their opinions on marriage for HIV+ people; their perceptions of the role of the church in HIV/AIDS work; and suggestions for how ROWAN can help to reduce stigma and encourage people to identify and disclose their HIV status.

One of my favorite questions we asked the special group members was whether or not they have hope. Most of them said that they had hope because of the great difference that ROWAN has made in their lives. *Continues on page 4.*

It was my joy to inform or remind them that everything that ROWAN does is because of the love of Jesus, and that Jesus brings a hope that endures not only when we are on earth, but a hope that is eternal. One observation from all of the home visits was that many people had experienced the love of Jesus, but they did not necessarily know that it was Jesus' love that they were experiencing. Or, if they did know Jesus, they had never been given the opportunity to confess Him as their Lord and Savior; they had never made a personal decision to follow Christ because they only knew of Christ in a vague sense. So it was our privilege to extend the invitation to follow Jesus to those who had not already made that decision.

To use a Biblical metaphor, the soil was so fertile because of all of the work that God had already done through ROWAN over the past several years. It was such a blessing for Ruby and me to have had the opportunity to help reap the harvest of all of the previous laborers. A total of 19 people made the decision to follow Jesus during the home visits! All glory goes to God.

During my time in Uganda, I learned many things, such as patience, love, humility, sacrifice, freeness and openness, gratitude, hope, and joy. I learned that God is in control, His love is vaster than we can ever imagine, and the hope that He gives through Jesus Christ will never disappoint us. \diamond
