BRO. JIM MCCONNELL

Brother Jim McConnell has been a faithful member of GCA for 30 years. Before coming to GCA, he served as an elder at Roxborough Bible Chapel for 5 years, and served as a deacon at GCA for 10 years and as an elder for 8 years.

His family has had a long history with Brethren Assemblies. A few years ago, Jim had an opportunity to meet most of his living relatives in Canada. It was a unique blessing to discover that all 87 of those present knew the Lord as Savior!

Jim was exposed to the gospel early, and at age 7, prayed to receive Christ as Savior. He was blessed to have a Christian upbringing with strong doctrinal foundation. This would prove to be very important, when at age 23, he went on active duty with the US Navy. Jim was committed to sharing his faith and was able to lead many souls to the Lord. He was asked to help lead a Bible study group, and right on-board ship, this band of believers regularly celebrated the Lord's Supper. His Navy service also gave him an opportunity for personal growth during visits to several European countries.

Jim worked with the Willet Stained Glass Studios in Philadelphia, the largest company of its kind in the US. Jim had the privilege of making stained glass windows for mainline churches all over the United States. Jim loved his work and researched the beliefs and traditions of each church he worked for, through study and personal talks with the clergymen. This was an amazing experience to learn 'what they believed' and 'why they believed what they believed.' Jim has given himself to the study of the Word and is a highly regarded Bible teacher. High blood pressure (BP) is called the "silent killer" because there are usually no warning symptoms and it can go untreated for a while before serious problems arise. High blood pressure is a risk factor for heart disease, strokes and kidney disease. It's best to monitor your BP at the doctor's office, as well as at home, to alert you of any abnormality so it can be immediately treated. The monitors are easily available at pharmacies, as well as retailers like Walmart and Sam's Club. If your blood pressure is high, your physician may intervene with medications. If it's only mildly elevated, certain systematic lifestyle changes could lower it. These can help:

WEIGHT LOSS AND EXERCISE

Losing 5-10% of your body weight can help to lower the BP along with other lifestyle changes. Regular exercise for about thirty minutes, five to seven days weekly, can strengthen the heart and lower the BP. Walking, jogging, cycling, swimming, climbing stairs, gardening and, of course, playing sports are good exercises. Toning exercises with suitable weights are also beneficial.

HEALTHY DIET

Decreasing processed foods, saturated fats, salt and sugar, while increasing whole grains, fruits and vegetables, greatly improves the diet. Read the labels on food products to know what is in the foods you're eating. Use herbs and spices instead of salt to improve the food's flavor. Limit alcohol and caffeine as these can not only increase BP but reduce the effectiveness of blood pressure medications.

QUIT SMOKING AND GET RESTFUL SLEEP

Smoking increases BP and contributes to lung disease and mortality. Quitting will greatly improve health. Get adequate, restful sleep. Spend time relaxing, even meditating with deep breathing exercises before bedtime. Carefully wind down and make your bedroom comfortable before resting.

REDUCE STRESS

We live fast-paced stressful lives due to demands at home, work and other activities. Stress can increase BP, so observe where you are most stressed and take steps to reduce or eliminate the stress triggers. Focus on issues you can control and resolve them. Prioritize activities, decreasing your workload where you must. Don't be overwhelmed: take time to do things you enjoy. Have fun with others. Practice expressing gratitude to God, family, friends and others. Surround yourself with supportive people. Be disciplined and take care of yourself. Enjoy your God-given life. \diamond

Bro. Merv served as one of the key persons on the deacon board and was actively involved in our planning and construction of the church building.

Bro. Merv has served in many leadership capacities. We pay special honor to Bro Merv Caruth for his leadership, commitment and service to God's people at GCA for over 35 years. ◆
