Love's Acid Test (Part 1 of 2)

Notes from a sermon by Pastor Brian H. Grant

A country preacher was preaching, reminding his church of the need to grow and expand. The preacher said, "This church needs to walk". A man in the back said, "Amen, brother, let it walk." The preacher said, "This church needs to run." The man said, "Amen brother, let her run." The preacher said, "This church needs to fly." The man said, "Amen, brother, let the church fly." The preacher then said, "You know folks, it's gonna take money to let the church fly." There was silence for a moment, and then the man in the back said, "Let the church walk, preacher, let it walk."

In many churches you can speak on almost any subject except money. But giving is one of the greatest tools that God uses to grow our faith and to test the sincerity of our love for Christ.

Why should I give?

First, let me tell you a story. One day James was spending time with his **six year** old son Dave. He asked Dave what he wanted to do. Dave wanted some french fries from McDonald's. So off they went to the golden arches. His Dad made the order. And Dave's heart pounded when Dad said – "**Super-size** the fries." His Dad took out his wallet and paid for the fries and a drink.

Dad said a brief grace, "God, bless this food. Amen", but it seemed like way too many words to Dave who was eager to sink into the fries. James was so happy to see Dave enjoying something so simple. So he decided to join in the fun and reached over to get a couple of Dave's fries for himself. To his surprise, his son quickly put his arms around his fries as though building a fort. Dave said. "No. these are mine."

James was in a state of shock. He couldn't believe it. James pulled back his hand and began to reflect about his son's attitude. He wondered: Does Dave realize that I provided the fries, that I gave him more than he was expecting since I supersized the fries? Why then is he talking about "my fries"? Also, since I am 6ft 4in and 220 lbs, I have the power to take all the fries despite his little arms surrounding them like a fort.

Dad didn't really need the fries; after all, one or two fries couldn't satisfy him if he was hungry. What he wanted was for Dave to invite him into the wonderful little world he had made possible for him. He wanted his son to be willing to share the very blessing that he had provided.

Has God provided you with any fries? Did he **supersize** it? Sadly, just like Dave, many of us want to put up a little fort around the "fries" God has given us. We don't want to share our resources with the God who gave them to us; the God who can take everything we have away. God doesn't **need** our money. The cattle on a 1000 hills are His. All the silver and gold are His. And yet this almighty God desires us to share with Him the very blessings He's given to us.

So why should we give?

1. I Give - As an act of Worship. There are at least 2 motivators for this worship:

A. Gratitude. Read 2 Corinthians 9:12.

He's the one who gave us all the fries. Amen. It's in Him we live and move and have our being. Everything we have comes from God's hand.

The most meaningful way you can show your gratitude to God for how He has blessed you is to generously share the resources He has entrusted to you with Him.

Don't miss what verse 12 is saying - generously giving to God's work is an overflowing expression of your gratitude to God.

But there's an even greater motivator for worshipping God with my giving:

B. Love. Read 2 Corinthians 8:8-9.

Paul tells us in 2 Cor. 8:8 our giving shows the sincerity of our love. I know folks will argue with this but I'm glad I'm not the one making the statement. So let me ask you, if giving is a test of the sincerity of your love, how do you measure up?

Excerpts from the public announcement from the Search Committee on April 14, 2014 (Having served since May 2013)

The bottom line in our deliberations was to discover the mind of the Lord in this matter. It is HIS church, and not ours. We proceeded along this new and different pathway, well-watered with prayer. We reached out to other well-respected pastors and assembly leaders informing them of our search and asking for any recommendations or advice. Our first order of business (in accordance with the mandate from our elders) was to draw a "picture" of the man we would be looking for. First was a list of nonnegotiables--the qualifications and character required of those who should be overseers over the household of God as found in 1st Timothy 3, Titus 1, 1st Peter 5, Matthew 20 and Acts 20.

The second was a 12-point list of our expectations that must also importantly be true of the man we are looking for, but expectations that would nevertheless allow for some flexibility owing to the fact that no man is without his own particular short-comings, limitations, and differences in abilities.

The committee ultimately settled on inviting six candidates to participate in our search process. The candidate we would ultimately recommend to the elders must possess the gift of pastor/teacher. He must also be a man who subscribes to our statement of faith and who understands and values our roots. \diamondsuit

We thank our brother Jim McConnell and the Pastor Search Committee for the fine work they have done. the valuable time and effort spent on this project. It has been a learning experience for all of us; but our God is faithful! He continues to answer our prayers.
