I just wanted to say a bit about in-home medical alert systems There are several types but essentially they are individually set up in the home, and the buyers are trained in their use as well as how to access their local 911 operator in an emergency. Some of these systems can help with carbon monoxide issues, home invasions, fire protection and health concerns.

The 911 operators are usually available at the press of a button. With senior citizens living well into their nineties and beyond, and having variable health issues, it is important to have these services readily available.

Many seniors are also home alone for long hours, or actually live alone so it can be reassuring to have access to some type of medical alert system. Each system must be carefully evaluated with an eye on cost and services offered. Having one of these systems may go a long way to alleviate attendant anxiety and promote a better quality of life. \Leftrightarrow

JESUS'BAR MİTZVAH

There is one incident from Jesus' early life recorded in Scripture, and this was when, at the age of 12, He traveled with His parents to Jerusalem.

Now his parents went to Jerusalem every year at the feast of the passover. And when he was twelve years old, they went up to Jerusalem after the custom of the feast.

Luke 2:41-42 (KJV)

So it was customary for Jesus' parents to journey to Jerusalem for Passover every year because that was their habit. Whether or not this was the first time Jesus went along, we don't know. But the trip in that year was more than 'customary,' because the text says it was made according to the customs of the feast. Therefore, in order to get the most out of this account of Jesus' early life, we need to understand something about Jewish customs and how Jews practiced their faith, for it was the traditions of the *Mishnah*, the oral traditions handed down by the rabbis, that set the tone for this trip up to Jerusalem. Jewish readers would immediately recognize the backstory here because they would be familiar with Jewish customs and religious practice. But for Gentile readers like us, that's less likely because the Luke account is silent about that.

This was a very special year in the life of the young Jesus, for being a 12-year-old Jewish boy meant that this was a year filled with the anticipation of turning 13.

The thirteenth birthday is the most important of birthdays for a Jewish boy. It's called his *Bar Mitzvah*. A Bar Mitzvah is the biggest moment in the life of this young Jew, for it marks his formal entrance into the community of Israel. This is when a boy becomes a man and officially becomes a son of the Covenant; literally, "Son of the *Torah*." That's what '*Bar Mitzvah*' means.



Continuing even today, this age-old tradition is an occasion marked with joyful celebration complete with a festive dinner with family and friends and the giving of gifts. Indeed, the boy may well receive gifts of money sufficient to provide for his education or even start him out in business when he is ready. But the year preceding his Bar Mitzvah is also serious business for the youngster of an observant Jewish household, for that is a year spent studying the Law and the Prophets and the customs of Judaism (Torah means 'teaching'), preparing him for an examination by the elders of the community who must approve of his Bar Mitzvah. And this would have described the scene when, at 12 years of age, the wisdom and learning of the boy Jesus first aroused attention; stunning the amazed teachers and all who heard Him there in Jerusalem.

Indeed, the Luke 2 account ends with this summary of Jesus' youth: "And Jesus increased in stature and favor with God and man." This, together with the testimony of His cousin John the Baptist at the Jordan, "Behold; the Lamb of God," and His ability to gather a large and devoted following immediately thereafter, indicates that by the time He began His public ministry, Jesus was already a person of note in the region of Galilee.

That He was something more than simply a prominent person, was about to become apparent at Cana. (John 2:1-11) \diamondsuit

A TRIP OF A LIFETIME, PART 2

Fifty eager and excited travelers embarked on a long anticipated trip to the Holy Land in October 2017. We could share only half of Sharon's report in the last issue of GCA Reflections.

Sharon surely makes us feel like we are there with her. There's more to cover. Here is the rest of her report.

We visited Ein Gedi (fabled Spring of David), and Masada--we took a cable car to see remnants of Herod's Palace on a very high mountain and where zealots made a last stand against Roman rule. Then we traveled to Hotel Daniel near the **Dead Sea** and had a swim in the Dead Sea while others enjoyed a spa treatment at the hotel.

Then we went on to Tiberius and Beit She'an where we saw the expansive excavations taking place at this ancient Roman Decapolis city.

We visited Chorazin (uninhabited structures)--a prominent city during Jesus' time; Caesarea Phillipi (Banias Spring) where Peter confessed that Jesus was the Christ, the Son of the living God; and Dan--the site of Jeroboam's altar of the golden calf and site where remains of the temple of Pan (known for its pagan worship) is located. We got to view the Golan Heights region where the United Nations monitors the situation between the Israeli and Syrian borders.

We experienced a boat ride on the Sea of Galilee in a replica of the ancient wooden boat used in Jesus' day. The boat owners played many songs of praise that made some of us break out in a "praise dance". At the destination on the other side, we saw an ancient boat discovered in the Sea of Galilee in 1986 believed to be from Jesus' time.

We visited old Capernaum with the ancient synagogue where Jesus spent most of His time in ministry and performed many miracles. We visited Tabgha-Multiplication of the Loaves and Fishes, and area of the Sermon on the Mount, and the Mount of the Beatitudes. Later, we traveled to the Jordan River where some of us were baptized as a sign of re-commitment to serving the Lord. It was a very memorable moment for me!

We were very privileged to have very knowledgeable Bible teachers of the Word on our trip--Dr. Tony Hart, Bro. George Peters and our own Pastor Brian Grant. They were very instrumental in reminding us from a biblical standpoint the relevance of some of the places we visited. We had many opportunities for reflection and worship. Our Israeli guide Deena was the best! She was very knowledgeable about Israeli history and the geo-political intricacies with the Palestinian problems that have plagued Israel all these years. She was familiar with Old and New Testament historical writings and made it relevant to the many sites we visited. She helped us understand their relationship to religious ties, history, archaeology and the culture of modern day life in Israel. She was very professional, passionate and most of all flexible with our

daily schedule and itinerary while we were there. Our bus driver Meir was exceptional in that he was able to maneuver our big bus around corners in some very tight spaces.
